The action of the river lifey excavated rock gorges along it's path. On some regions near its main loop, the riverbed showed granite rocks – evidence the river is old – the estimates are that the Liffey River appeared either in early pre-glacial or late Cainozoic. Along the course of the River Liffey, several pre-glacial trenches appear, further compounding the argument that the River Liffey is from earlier periods.

In south and southwest Ireland, large portions of cretaceous flint appeared – those are derived from chalk from the sea bed.

Besides that – there's a pre-glacial beach on Courtmacsherry.
